# FRUITLAND PARK CITY COMMISSION REGULAR MEETING MINUTES May 11, 2017

A regular meeting of the Fruitland Park City Commission was held at 506 W. Berckman Street, Fruitland Park, Florida 34731 on Thursday, May 11, 2017 at 6:00 p.m.

**Members Present**: Mayor Chris Cheshire, Vice Mayor John L. Gunter, Jr., Commissioners Christopher Bell, Ray Lewis, and Rick Ranize.

Also Present: City Manager Gary La Venia, City Attorney Anita Geraci-Carver, City Treasurer; Jeannine Racine-Michaud; Police Chief Michael Fewless; Lieutenant Eric Luce, Police Department; Interim Fire Chief Don Gilpin; Assistant Fire Chief Tim Yoder; Chris Lewis, and Taylor Luttfring, Fire Department; Parks and Recreation Director Michelle Yoder; Community Development Director Charlie Rector, Public Works Director Dale Bogle, and City Clerk Esther B. Coulson.

#### 1. CALL TO ORDER, INVOCATION AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

After Mayor Cheshire called the meeting to order at 6:02 p.m.; Ms. Sharon Burris, Heritage Community Church, gave the invocation, and Chief Fewless led in the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag.

#### 2. ROLL CALL

At Mayor Cheshire's request, Ms. Coulson called the roll and a quorum was present.

#### **Special Recognition**

After Mayor Cheshire referred to the May 10, 2017 Service Above Self Award event, Chief Fewless gave a background of the annual event recognizing the nominations of Lake County law enforcement officers for the "Service Above Self" program award.

Chief Fewless recalled the city commission's presentation of lifesaving awards, at its June 9, 2016 regular meeting honoring Officer Brad Heidt for his life-saving techniques administered to the then nearly four-year-old Bentley who nearly drowned. Chief Fewless explained that Officer Heidt was chosen amongst 13 agencies as "the Lake County Officer of the Year" at the Leesburg Noon Rotary's "Service Above Self" Awards" and displayed the plaque that was presented to the City of Fruitland Park.

Mayor Cheshire, in noting the absence of Officer Heidt, explained that the city commission will reserve another time to hold a special presentation in his honor.

# 3. PROCLAMATION - "Stamp Out Hunger" National Food Drive Day Proclamation – May 13, 2017

Mayor Cheshire recognized the "Stamp Out Hunger" National Food Drive Day Proclamation – May 13, 2017 proclamation which will be presented at a later date. to Mr. Shane Ulbin, National Association of Letter Carriers Branch 1091 Food Drive Coordinator.

Mayor Cheshire announced that Saturday, May 13, 2017 is the *National Food Drive Day* and encouraged the residents to support the food drive by placing a bag or can of non-perishable food next to their mailboxes prior to their letter carrier's arrival who will pick it up while delivering the mail.

#### 4. PRESENTATIONS

#### (a) Water Safety Day

Mr. Jim Harrison, Straight Forward Ministries, Inc/Swimming For Life (founded by his wife and himself), acknowledged Chief Fewless' earlier special recognition which related to the near drowning incident of a child and gave an historical overview on the reasons why Lake County has been in involved in same since 2012 in water safety prevention and its establishment of the Water Safety Council. He described the Water Safety Day events (countywide by Lake County municipalities) where the City of Fruitland Park is involved on May 20, 2017 and encouraged everyone to participate.

Mr. Harrison invited families to access the website: <a href="https://www.swimmingforlife.com/">https://www.swimmingforlife.com/</a> to apply for, receive swim scholarships and register with various cities in the county for a \$5.00-dollar fee; addressed the goal to enlist 1,000 children, and highlighted Florida as the leading nation in accidental drowning in children ages one to four. He expressed appreciation to those involved for the cooperation given for this effort.

On behalf of the city commission, Mayor Cheshire thanked Mr. Harrison for his presentation.

#### (b) Fruitland Park Elementary School

Dr. Kristi Burns, Lake County School Board Member District 2, gave a very brief overview of her biochemistry background; pointed out the district's retention in December 2016 of new superintendent Ms. Dr. Diane S. Kornegay, and described the performance that she undertook resulting in positive feedbacks received on her promotion of the schools' excellence within the community and the school district.

Dr. Burns referred to the building of Fruitland Park Elementary School (at the same site) and the meeting of its timeline within five years; the attempts to pay off debt from different revenue sources, and state law's requirement to meet the correct number of enrolled students. She mentioned the \$400,000 investment earmarked towards improving and resolving the air quality issue at the elementary school

The city commission pointed out District 1 School Board Member Bill Mathias' appearance at its October 13, 2016 regular meeting and the consensus reached on waiving the wastewater impact fee in exchange for the undeveloped property owned by the school board near Urick Street and his indication to convey same to the school board.

Ms. Tammy Langley, Fruitland Park Elementary School Principal, relayed at Dr. Burns' request, that she was informed that the elementary school would be rebuilt on the same school site.

After discussion, Dr. Burns recalled the discussions she had with the school's chief of operations regarding the wastewater at the current site as well as impact fees; however, she explained that she will find out more information on the undeveloped school board property and address same with Mr. La Venia.

In response to an inquiry posed by Mr. Mike Sweeney, City of Fruitland Park resident, the city commission and Dr. Burns confirmed the discussions held on the properties owned by the school board.

Ms. Langley explained that the school board staff met with the elementary school's faculty staff addressing the next steps relating to the elementary school including assuring them of resolving the air quality issues during Summer 2017. She confirmed, in response to Commissioner Ranize' inquiry, that traffic flow on CR 466A will continue to be an ongoing discussion with Chief Fewless.

Dr. Burns gave an overview of the reorganization of the school districts' three regions initiated by Dr. Kornegay. Dr. Burns identified the north district (Mount Dora-Umatilla region) and mentioned the south lake region, and noted that reports will be made to a regional director to determine the regions' needs.

Ms. Connie Bame, Fruitland Park Elementary First-Grade Teacher, announced that the second 2017-18 Fruitland Park Elementary National Elementary Honor Society will be holding a ceremony at the elementary school's cafeteria on May 11, 2017 at 6:00 p.m. to induct its members and extended the invitation to the city commission welcoming them to attend.

In concurring with Vice Mayor Gunter, Mayor Cheshire encouraged Dr. Burns and Ms. Langley to appear before the city commission to direct any issues of concern or contact with Mr. La Venia.

#### 5. CONSENT AGENDA

**Approval of Minutes** 

On motion of Commissioner Lewis, seconded by Commissioner Bell and unanimously carried, the city commission approved the April 27, 2017 regular meeting minutes as submitted.

#### 6. **REGULAR AGENDA**

#### (a) Fire Department – Windows Server - MMD Computer Center Inc.

The city commission considered its request to authorize the approval of costs from MMD Computer Center Inc. for the installation and connection of the fire department's Windows Server 2016 to city hall and relayed reasons on connecting same by using the Wi-Fi as opposed to the virtual private network.

After Mr. La Venia referred to the quotes received from MMD Computer Center Inc., and Interim Fire Chief Gilpin described same to connect the Fire Department's computer system into the city's server, Ms. Coulson gestured in the affirmative to Mr. La Venia's statements on the fire department utilizing the Wi-Fi route as a cost-effective means to access records before acquiring hardwire prior to the new fire department building.

After much discussion and by unanimous consent, the city commission approved staff's recommendation for MMD Computer Center Inc. to install and configure by wireless data network the fire department's server to city hall at a cost of \$1,060.00.

(b) First Reading - Ordinance 2017-016 - Personnel Policies and Procedures Manual - Family Employment-Nepotism and Personal Relationships

Ms. Geraci-Carver read into the record, proposed Ordinance 207-016, the substance of which is as follows:

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF FRUITLAND PARK, FLORIDA, ADOPTING REVISIONS TO POLICY 2.4 IN THE CITY OF FRUITLAND PARK'S PERSONNEL POLICIES AND PROCEDURES MANUAL LAST REVISED IN ORDINANCE 2014-018; PROVIDING FOR DIRECTIONS; PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE. (The second reading will be held on June 8, 2017.)

Ms. Geraci-Carver referred to the city commission's action at its April 27, 2017 regular meeting on the removal of provisions pertaining to city commissioners where they are not considered as city employees.

A motion was made by Commissioner Ranize and seconded by Vice Mayor Gunter that the city commission approve Ordinance 2017-016 as previously cited.

There were no comments from the public at this time.

Mayor Cheshire called for a roll call vote on the motion and declared it carried unanimously.

(c) First Reading - Ordinance 2017-017 Repealing Local Traffic Movement Regulation Ordinance 2017-011

Ms. Geraci-Carver read into the record, proposed Ordinance 207-017, the substance of which is as follows:

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF FRUITLAND PARK, FLORIDA, REPEALING ORDINANCE

2017-011 WHICH CONTROLS AND REGULATES TRUCK TRAFFIC ON CERTAIN STREETS IN THE CITY OF FRUITLAND PARK; PROVIDING FOR DIRECTIONS; SETTING AN EFFECTIVE DATE. (The second reading will be held on June 8, 2017.)

There were no comments from the public at this time.

A motion was made by Commissioner Lewis and seconded by Commissioner Ranize that the city commission approve Ordinance 2017-017 as previously cited.

Mayor Cheshire called for a roll call vote on the motion and declared it carried unanimously.

(d) First Reading – Ordinance 2017-018 Parks and Recreation Fees, Section 99.90 Ms. Geraci-Carver read into the record, proposed Ordinance 207-018, the substance of which is as follows:

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF FRUITLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, FLORIDA; AMENDING SECTION 99.90, IN CHAPTER 99 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES TO AUTHORIZE THE RECREATION DIRECTOR TO SET CERTAIN RECREATION FEES AND TO DELETE FEES FOR THE CASINO; PROVIDING FOR INCLUSION IN THE CODE, SEVERABILITY AND CONFLICTS; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

Ms. Geraci-Carver confirmed in response to Vice Mayor Gunter's inquiry that future rate changes reflected in the body of the ordinance would not be considered before the city commission by resolution.

In response to Mr. La Venia's inquiry, Ms. Geraci-Carver confirmed in the affirmative that language can be included in the proposed ordinance to allow the recreation director to set the rates and the commission subsequently adopting same by resolution. She explained Municode Code Corporation's preference, during the codification process, to review fees adopted by resolution whereby language on same would be included in the city's code.

On motion of Commissioner Ranize, seconded by Commissioner Lewis and unanimously carried, the city commission postponed its action to approve proposed Ordinance 2017-018 as previously cited.

In response to Mr. La Venia's inquiry, Ms. Yoder cited reasons why she is suggesting the removal of charges for residents and non-residents that are incorporated within the body of the ordinance.

By unanimous consent, the city commission accepted the city attorney's suggestion that proposed Ordinance 2017-018 would be postponed to the June 8, 2817 regular meeting.

#### (e) First Reading – Ordinance 2017-019 Curfew

Mayor Cheshire indicated that proposed Ordinance 2017-019, the title of which is as follows, will be withdrawn from this evening's agenda:

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF FRUITLAND PARK, FLORIDA, CREATING SEC. 132.07 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF FRUITLAND PARK TO INCORPORATE THE JUVENILE CURFEW PROVISIONS SET FORTH IN FLORIDA STATUTES; ESTABLISHING GEOGRAPHIC APPLICATION; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR CODIFICATION; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE. (The second reading will be held on June 8, 2017.)

Mayor Cheshire referred to previous reports made to him by a former law enforcement officer that there were no existing enacted ordinances reflecting the city parks' operating hours; indicated that the proposed ordinance is not what he had envisioned, and stated that it was not what Chief Fewless desired.

As requested by Mayor Cheshire, Chief Fewless referred to Mr. Bogle's previous approach to the law enforcement officers on damages that took place at Veterans Park to which Mr. La Venia explained that Chief Fewless' inquiry for a gate is being implemented.

Where there are no posted signs reflecting the parks' opening and closing hours, Chief Fewless mentioned the law enforcement officers' rights to question individuals who are at the parks after hours; thus, he indicated that a curfew is not required. He addressed the need to keep people away from city property and expressed preference for times of operation to be posted on the signs.

After discussion, Ms. Geraci-Carver explained that such enforcement could be made by adopting a resolution referencing the code whereby the city commission would establish the parks' hours and pointed out the State Attorney's Office requiring signs to be posted in accordance to Florida State Statutes, Regulation of Recreation Activities, to which the city commission members acknowledged the existence of same.

In response to Mayor Cheshire's inquiries on the law enforcement officers monitoring of activities at the parks and the installation of gates at other park locations, Chief Fewless described the type of gates and confirmed the ability for

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officers to gain access which would prevent vehicles from entrance and any potential damage to the parks.

Following extensive discussions and on motion of Commissioner Bell, seconded by Commissioner Lewis and unanimously carried, the city commission withdrew from this evening's agenda, its action to approve Curfew Ordinance 2017-019 as previously cited.

#### 7. NEW BUSINESS

There was no new business to come before the city commission at this time.

#### 8. OFFICERS' REPORTS

#### (a) City Manager

#### i. City Grants

In response to a question posed, Mr. La Venia gave a status update on the city's grants:

- State of Florida Department of Environmental Protection, Florida Recreation Development Assistance Program Grants for Gardenia Park Phases I and II were previously submitted.
- State of Florida Department of Environmental Protection, Division of Water Restoration Assistance Grants for the Fruitland Park Capital Lift Station and Force Main and Fruitland Park Lady Lake Wastewater Interconnection Projects have been handled by Ms. Racine-Michaud and a progress report was provided on same.
- State of Florida Department of State, Division of Library and Information Services Public Library Construction Grant for the Fruitland Park Public Library is not due until June 15, 2017; thus, conversations have been held with Booth, Ern, Straughan & Hiott Inc. (BESH), engineers retained by the city, regarding the compilation of same.

#### ii. CR 466A

Mr. La Venia referred to the current completion of the CR 466A roadway improvements; placed emphasis on the need to address the forthcoming change in traffic patterns for Fruitland Park Elementary School, and relayed information from Lake County on its intent to procure Phase III CR 466A roadway construction improvements to four lanes scheduled for late 2017 and early 2018 where it will be incomplete beyond Poinsettia Avenue.

#### (b) City Attorney

#### i. Lawsuits and Notices of Claims

Ms. Geraci-Carver referred to the following litigation matters:

- James and Rita Homonai v. Foster, Crenshaw and City of Fruitland Park a response in the case filed is pending from Ms. Stephanie J. McCullock, McLin Burnsed Attorney;
- Green v. City of Fruitland Park, Hunnewell, Isom & Isaacs third amended complaint case where the city was added is pending the court's ruling on the city's motion to dismiss, and
- **Notices of Claims** nothing has been filed and there are no developments on the following:
  - o Anthony Mancino,
  - o James Hartson, and
  - o Larry Odum.

#### ii. City Attorney - Pennsylvania Avenue - Terry Ross Duplex Project

Ms. Geraci-Carver referred to the city commission's discussions at its April 27, 2017 regular meeting on the Terry Ross Duplex Project, Pennsylvania Avenue; pointed out that it does not appear said project meets the city's zoning code requirements, and made comparisons of the following:

- minimum dwelling unit size of 1,200 square feet is required by city code; however, each unit -- lots 18 and 19 (Pennsylvania Avenue Forest Avenue duplexes) -- are about 924 square feet each;
- 10,000 square feet minimum lot size requirement is required by city code; however, the units have a minimum dwelling unit size of 8,250 square feet;
- site setback on lot 18 on the north side is five feet. the city code requires 10 feet, and
- lot sizes are 150 by 55 feet and the minimum lot code requirement for Residential 2 District (R-2) zoning is 80 feet.

If the applicant intends to pursue the subject matter as constructed, Ms. Geraci-Carver described the procedures to be taken before the Planning and Zoning (P&Z) Board and the determination to be made by the city commission as to whether the criteria was met and to consider granting the variance from city code.

In outlining the city's option, Ms. Geraci-Carver described how case law would support (when the building permit is issued in violation of the code and when construction has commenced which is void from the beginning and has no authority) the city's right to rescind and its requirement to remove construction.

Ms. Geraci-Carver mentioned the applicant's decision to pursue the condominium process allowing for separate or part ownership of the detached unit as required by code; recognized that the problem -- the setback, minimum lot size, and minimum unit size -- would not be cured as they are contrary to the city's code, and described the potential legal standing as a result of the city commission's decision. She gave reasons why she recommended that the city commission leave the building as a nonconforming use and not consider the granting of variances which would allow other applicants in a similar situation to implement same.

After discussion, Ms. Geraci-Carver answered in the affirmative to Vice Mayor Gunter's question that a stop work order can be placed on the property.

A motion was made by Commissioner Ranize that the city commission authorizing the placement of a stop work order on the Terry Ross Duplex Project, Pennsylvania Avenue and direct the city attorney to negotiate with the applicant's legal representative methods to remedy the problems relating to same.

Following extensive deliberations, Mr. Rector explained that throughout the subject issue, and in discussions with the city manager, he has not been approached and no inquiries were made of him. He voiced his disagreement with Ms. Geraci-Carver's previous remarks and explained it is permitted for a recorded lot of record to be buildable lots under the old land development regulations (LDRs) with requirements allowing for a five-foot set back under the R-2 zoning designation.

Mayor Cheshire referred to Mr. La Venia's previous discussion with the city commission members on his belief that an independent professional company would review the issue that Mr. Rector is referring as it pertains to what took place and the ongoing activities. Mr. La Venia explained tha it would require the city commission's consensus whereby a report on the subject inquiry would be anticipated by mid-June 2017.

After discussion and by unanimous, the city commission agreed to not authorize the issuance of a stop work order on the Terry Ross Duplex Project, Pennsylvania Avenue and directed the city attorney to negotiate with the applicant's legal representative methods to remedy the problems relating to same.

In response to Mayor Cheshire's question on halting any further actions on the subject project, Ms. Geraci-Carver referred to a proposed ordinance she drafted and forwarded to Mr. La Venia to be considered before the P&Z Board allowing single-family attached residential dwelling units in R-2 and R-2A zoning only as a special exception use to be approved by the city commission. (A copy of the document is filed with the supplemental papers to the minutes of this meeting.)

Following further discussions and after Mr. Rector recognized that the next P&Z Board meeting will be on May 18, 2017, Ms. Geraci-Carver agreed with Commissioner Ranize' comments that the applicant could apply for a permit between now and that time.

Upon Mayor Cheshire's suggestion and by unanimous consent, the city commission aagreed to hold a special meeting, following the May 18, 2017 Planning and Zoning Board, to consider the proposed ordinance allowing single-family attached residential dwelling units in Residential 2 (R-2) and R-2A zoning districts and accepted the city attorney's suggestion to abide by the advertising requirements for a change in the city's land development regulation's zoning code for permittable and allowable use before scheduling the first and second reading.

The motion to place a stop order on the property and direct the city attorney to negotiate with the applicant's legal representative methods to remedy the problems relating to the Terry Ross Duplex Project on Pennsylvania Avenue died for a lack of a second.

Mr. Carlisle Burch, City of Fruitland Park resident, gave his opinion that the subject building should not have existed; however, it was erected; felt that the city is working to justify the initial duplexes, and believed that the process of building the properties slowed, which he thinks ought to be demolished. He stated that as a result of remarks made to the neighbors, efforts were made to expedite work which h believed was to sway the city commission's decision.

Ms. I. Woods, City of Fruitland Park resident, expressed concerns on her experience with Mr. Rector and the process involved on the subject issue.

Mr. D. Johnston, City of Fruitland Park resident, pointed out his recent relocation to the subject area and expressed his support to demolish the subject project.

Ms. Rita Ranize, City of Fruitland Park resident, stated that regardless of fault, she believes a stop work order ought to be issued until the completion of an investigation mitigating further costs to the applicant and the city.

Later in the meeting, and on motion of Commissioner Ranize, seconded by Commissioner Lewis and unanimously carried, the city commission approved staff's recommendation to retain Andrew J. Hand Esq., Sheppard, Smith & Cassady PA, to serve as an investigatory attorney/factfinder regarding the Terry Ross Development (construction of a duplex, single family, attached housing, condominium on Pennsylvania Avenue) at a cost not to exceed \$12,000.00 and authorized the city manager to report back to the city commission if costs exceeds same.

#### 9. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Mr. Peter Hurtt, City of Fruitland Park resident, pointed out the Coffee with the Mayor events hosted by former Mayor Bell and Mr. La Venia; indicated that they were informative and well attended, and anticipated that they would be reinstated.

In response, Mayor Cheshire suggested that Mr. La Venia determine dates to host the Coffee with the Mayor event at the Fruitland Park Library and The Villages.

After Ms. Ranize alerted the city commission on Lake County's recent connection of water lines to conduct training at the Chelsea Run neighborhood, Mr. Bogle reported that he has contacted the county who promised to get back in touch with him.

#### 10. COMMISSIONERS' COMMENTS

#### (a) Commissioner Ranize

#### **Code Compliance**

Commissioner Ranize acknowledged the efforts being made to comply with and to improve problems relating to code enforcement. With reference to the LDRs addressed earlier at this evening's meeting, he expressed issues he has with Mr. Rector's comments, with the protocols when addressing a city officer and elected officials, and with the information that was brought to his attention by citizens.

#### (b) Commissioner Lewis

Commissioner Lewis stated that he had nothing to report at this time.

#### (c) Commissioner Bell

Commissioner Bell acknowledged Mr. Rector's tenure and his satisfactory performance; expressed his confidence in Mr. La Venia during the investigatory process, and indicated that he will withhold any further judgements until the results of same are received.

#### (d) Vice Mayor Gunter, Jr.

Vice Mayor Gunter referred to the turnout at the May 10, 2017 2017 Lake County Community Service Awards and his discussions with the elected officials and Mr. Jim Stivender Jr., Lake County Public Works Director, regarding CR 466A.

After discussion, Mr. La Venia reported that CR 466A Phase IIIB roadway improvement project (from Poinsettia Avenue to Windy Acres) has been postponed. He described a meeting Messrs. Bogle, Rector and himself had with

Mr. Duane K. Booth, BESH, regarding the city's entire project and the relocation of utilities on CR 466A Phase IIIA project at an approximate cost of \$160,000.

#### 11. MAYOR'S COMMENTS

#### (a) City Highlights

Mayor Cheshire recalled his initial period, as an elected official, and progress the city has made since that time; addressed the need for transparency, and noted the opportunity the city has to do the right thing for the citizens.



In response to the specific comments received, we offer the following:

#### LPG Urban & Regional Planners

- 1. Per our conversation with Charlie, we have revised the site to reflect the use as a Shopping Center. The parking required for a shopping center is 1 space per 250 square feet. The site data box has been revised to reflect adequate parking.
- 2. The Variance Resolution number has been added to the plan.
- 3. The Owner's phone number has been added to the plan.
- 4. The surrounding zoning and land use have been added to the plan.
- 5. The landscape plan has been revised to show a 10' buffer along Rose Street.
- 6. The buffer shrub quantities are in accordance with buffer requirements table in chapter 164 which requires 15 shrubs per 100 lineal feet of buffer. The planting shown is in excess of the requirements. We have replaced the azaleas with an alternate shrub from the approved shrub list.
- 7. An irrigation plan will be submitted as soon as a Certified Contractor has been hired for this project.
- 8. The Chinaberry trees have been removed from the plan. A note was added to the landscape detail plan to describe the removal and replacement tree ratio for this project.

#### BESH

- 1. The pre-development curve number has been changed to 39 as requested.
- 2. The soils report has been revised per the recommendations.

2. TEMPORARY EROSION CONTROL TO BE UTILIZED DURING CONSTRUCTION AT AREAS DESIGNATED BY THE ENGINEER OR AREAS ON SITE WHERE UNSTABILIZED GRADES MAY CAUSE EROSION PROBLEMS. EROSION CONTROL MAY BE REMOVED AFTER UPSLOPE AREA HAS BEEN STABILIZED BY SOD, OR COMPACTED AS DETERMINED BY THE ENGINEER.

3. PERMANENT EROSION AND SEDIMENT CONTROL MEASURES SHALL BE INSTALLED AT THE EARLIEST PRACTICAL TIME CONSISTENT WITH GOOD CONSTRUCTION PRACTICES. ONE OF THE FIRST CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES SHOULD BE THE PLACEMENT OF PERMANENT AND TEMPORARY EROSION AND SEDIMENT CONTROL MEASURES AROUND THE PERIMETER OF THE PROJECT OR THE INITIAL WORK AREA TO PROTECT THE PROJECT, ADJACENT PROPERTIES AND WATER RESOURCES.

4. TEMPORARY EROSION AND SEDIMENT CONTROL MEASURES SHALL BE COORDINATED WITH PERMANENT MEASURES TO ASSURE ECONOMICAL, EFFECTIVE AND CONTINUOUS CONTROL THROUGHOUT THE CONSTRUCTION PHASE. TEMPORARY MEASURES SHALL NOT BE CONSTRUCTED FOR EXPEDIENCY IN LIEU OF PERMANENT MEASURES.

5. EROSION AND SEDIMENT CONTROL MEASURES SHALL BE ADEQUATELY MAINTAINED TO PERFORM THEIR INTENDED FUNCTION DURING CONSTRUCTION OF THE PROJECT.

6. NECESSARY REPAIRS TO BARRIERS OR REPLACEMENT OF BARRIERS SHALL BE ACCOMPLISHED PROMPTLY.

7. SEDIMENT DEPOSITS SHOULD BE REMOVED AFTER EACH RAINFALL. THEY MUST BE REMOVED WHEN THE LEVEL OF DEPOSITION REACHES APPROXIMATELY ONE HALF THE HEIGHT OF THE BARRIER.

8. MATERIAL FROM SEDIMENT TRAPS SHALL NOT BE STOCKPILED OR DISPOSED OF IN A MANNER WHICH MAKES THEM READILY SUSCEPTIBLE TO BEING WASHED INTO ANY WATERCOURSE BY RUNOFF OR HIGH WATER.

9. ANY SEDIMENT DEPOSITS REMAINING IN PLACE AFTER THE BARRIERS ARE NO LONGER REQUIRED SHALL BE DRESSED TO CONFORM TO THE EXISTING GRADE, PREPARED AND SEEDED.

# NPDES Requirements

• Federal Law prohibits all point source discharge of pollutants, which includes the discharge of stormwater associated with large (greater than 5 acres) construction activities or small (less than 5 acres and greater than 1 acres) construction activities, to waters of the United States without a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit. Under the State of Florida's authority to administer the NPDES stormwater program, operators that have stormwater discharge associated with large or small construction activities to surface waters of the State, including through a Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4, i.e. Town, City or County), shall obtain coverage either under a Generic permit or an Individual permit.

• The owner will obtain the NDPES permit during the permitting process.

• The Contractor shall prepare the Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP). Contractor may obtain information pertaining to the NPDES program online at www.dep.state.fl.us/water/stormwater/npdes. The Contractor shall be responsible for maintenance of the site in accordance with the SWPPP. The Contractor will be required to comply with all requirements of the SWPPP and have it posted on-site along with the Erosion Control Plan, the NPDES permit, and the completed Inspection Report Forms. The Contractor shall be responsible for all erosion control practices defined in the SWPPP and associated penalties for not complying with the NPDES requirements contained in the SWPPP and the NPDES permit. The cost of all compliance related activities shall be included in the bid submitted by the Contractor.

• The NPDES permit requires at least weekly inspections of the site and inspections within 24 hours following any rainfall event exceeding 0.5" inches. The Contractor is responsible for the weekly inspections and post-rainfall event inspections and these inspections are required to be made by a "Qualified" inspector. These inspections must document compliance with the permit and the SWFPP and the inspector shall complete the Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan Inspection Report Form. The Contractor can obtain a sample copy of the Inspection Report Form from the Engineer. The Contractor can contact the FDEP at (850) 245-7522 for additional information on qualified inspectors or additional information on the NPDES requirements.

- **Section 3.** Casino. The Casino no longer exists. Therefore, fees relating to the use of the Casino are repealed.
- **Section 4.** <u>Inclusion in Code.</u> It is the intent of the Commissioners that, with the exception of Section 3, the provisions of this Ordinance shall become and be made a part of the City of Fruitland Park Code and that the sections of this Ordinance may be renumbered or relettered and the word "ordinance" may be changed to "section", "article", or such other appropriate word "or phrase in order to accomplish such intentions.

#### **ORDINANCE 2017-021**

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF FRUITLAND PARK, FLORIDA, AMENDING SECTION 95.04 TO INCLUDE A DEFINITION OF PARK; CREATING SECTION 95.19 TO ESTABLISH PARK HOURS FOR THE CITY'S PARKS; CREATING EXCEPTIONS; PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR CODIFICATION; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICT; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City desires to establish hours of operation for its parks; and

**WHEREAS**, the City recognizes exceptions to the hours of operation may be necessary to accommodate special events or safety issues which may arise from time to time; and

**WHEREAS**, the City believes it is in the best interests of the public health, safety and welfare for the City to establish hours of operations and reasonable rules and regulations.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF FRUITLAND PARK, FLORIDA:

**Section 1:** Recitals. The above recitals are true and correct and, by this reference, are hereby incorporated into and made an integral part of this ordinance.

**Section 2: Definitions.** That Section 95.04 in Chapter 95 of the City of Fruitland Park Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to add the following definition:

Park or City park(s) shall mean those public recreation areas, including but not limited to parks, play grounds, buildings, swimming pools, and improvements which are located thereon, owned by the City of Fruitland Park and maintained as a park.

**Section 3:** Hours of operation for city parks; exceptions. That Section 95.19 in Chapter 95 of the City of Fruitland Park Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

### Section 95.19. - Hours of operation for city parks; exceptions.

- (a) City parks shall be closed from 11:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. daily, Sunday through Saturday, except that hours for certain public recreation areas may be altered or extended as hereafter provided.
- (b) It shall be unlawful for any person to willfully enter upon or remain in any city park except between the authorized hours provided or such altered or

- extended hours as authorized in this section. Any person found in violation of this subsection is trespassing, and may be punished in accordance with Florida statute.
- (c) Park hours for each park, and if applicable, sections of the park, shall be posted.
- (d) The city manager or city commission is authorized to close any park or area of a park or alter the hours of operation, including during authorized hours of operation, if in the city manager's or city commission's discretion, said closure or alteration of operation hours is in the interest of the public health, safety and welfare and upon the erection of signs giving notice thereof.
- (e) The city manager or city commission is authorized to extend or alter the hours of operation for special events sponsored by or authorized by the City Commission and upon the erection of signs giving notice thereof.
- **Section 4: Severability** If any portion of this ordinance is declared invalid or unenforceable, then to the extent it is possible to do so without destroying the overall intent and effect of this ordinance, the portion deemed invalid or unenforceable shall be severed here from and the remainder of this ordinance shall continue in full force and effect as if it were enacted without including the portion found to be invalid or unenforceable.
- **Section 5:** Codification The text of this Ordinance shall be codified as a part of the City of Fruitland Park Code of Ordinance. The codifier is granted broad and liberal authority in renumbering and codifying the provision of this Ordinance.
- **Section 6:** Conflict All ordinances or parts of ordinances, resolutions or parts of resolutions, which are in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed, to the extent necessary to alleviate the conflict, but shall continue in effect insofar as they are not in conflict herewith, unless repeal of the conflicting portion destroys the overall intent and effect of any of the conflicting ordinances, in which case those ordinances so affected shall be hereby repealed in their entirety.

**Section 7: Effective Date** This Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon passage by the City Commission of the City of Fruitland Park.

#### **ORDINANCE 2017-020**

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF FRUITLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, FLORIDA; AMENDING PROVISIONS SET FORTH IN CHAPTER 31 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES RELATING TO THE **FIRE DEPARTMENT**; ESTABLISHING A HYBRID FIRE DEPARTMENT CONSISTING OF PAID PERSONNEL AND VOLUNTEER PERSONNEL; AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO APPOINTMENT A FIRE CHIEF AND PERSONNEL; DEFINING DUTIES AND POWERS OF FIRE CHIEF; PROVIDING FOR COMPENSATION AS AUTHORIZED BY THE CITY **COMMISSION**; **PROVIDING FOR CODIFICATION AND** SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICTS AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

**WHEREAS**, the City is authorized pursuant to Chapter 166, Florida Statutes to establish a fire department; and

**WHEREAS,** the City Commission desires to convert its volunteer fire department to a hybrid fire department which will include both paid and volunteer personnel; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Commission finds it is in the best interests of the City residents, businesses and properties within the corporate limits of Fruitland Park, and furthers the health, safety and welfare of its citizens and businesses to establish a hybrid fire department.

**NOW, THEREFORE**, **BE IT ORDAINED** by the Commissioners of the City of Fruitland Park, Lake County, Florida, as follows:

**Section 1.** Recitals. The foregoing recitals are true and correct.

**Section 2.** Establishment; appointment. Section 31.55 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Fruitland Park, Florida is amended to read as follows:

### 31.55. – Establishment; appointment of chief and members.

There is hereby created and established a fire department. The fire department shall be a hybrid department, having both paid and volunteer positions (collectively "personnel"). The city manager is authorized and shall appoint a fire chief who shall have the duties and authority set forth in sec. 31.56 of this code. The city manager is authorized and may appoint such subordinate officers and personnel of the fire department as necessary within the budget established by the commission.

**Section 3.** <u>Duties; powers.</u> Section 31.56 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Fruitland Park, Florida is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 31.56. - Duties, powers of Fire Chief.

- (a) The fire chief shall have control of the fire department, firefighting personnel, fire equipment and apparatus of the city, subject to such rules and regulations as are prescribed by the city manager.
- (b) The fire chief shall have the full responsibility at all times for providing for the protection from fire hazard of all persons and property within the city.
- (c) It shall be the duty of the chief to attend any meetings of the city commission if so requested by any member of the city commission or the city manager.
- (d) The fire chief shall make recommendations from time to time as he/she deems appropriate for the better and more adequate protection of the city. In the absence or disability of the chief of the fire department, the deputy fire chief shall have charge and control of the fire department to the same extent as that of the chief.
- (e) The fire chief shall keep or cause to be kept a record of all fires and all other responses. All records of the fire department, being city records, shall be subject to the provisions of F.S. Ch. 119.
- (f) All regulations issued by the state fire marshal shall be enforceable by the fire chief. The fire chief is authorized to perform within the city any duties that may be imposed upon the city by such law and regulations, or in accordance therewith, and to have such assistance as he/she may find necessary from other officials of the city in the discharge of such duties.

**Section 4.** <u>Compensation.</u> Section 31.57 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Fruitland Park, Florida is amended to read as follows:

### Sec. 31.57. - Compensation.

The fire chief and personnel of the fire department shall receive compensation as provided for by the city commission. The fire chief and personnel shall not be otherwise paid unless approved by the city commission. The fire chief and personnel shall not accept or be paid any fees or compensation or accept gratuities from any person, firm, or organization for the performance of their official duties other than that compensation paid to them by the city.

**Section 5.** <u>Service outside corporate limits</u>. Section 31.58 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Fruitland Park, Florida is amended to read as follows:

### Sec. 31.58. - Service outside corporate limits.

The fire chief and personnel of the fire department are authorized to go outside the corporate limits of the city for the purpose of rendering aid to other fire departments in accordance with automatic and mutual aid agreements.

**Section 6.** Reserved. Sec. 31-39 – 31.71 are reserved.

**Section 7.** <u>Codification.</u> It is the intent of the Commissioners that the provisions of this Ordinance shall become and be made a part of the City of Fruitland Park Code and that the sections of this Ordinance may be renumbered or relettered and the word "ordinance" may be changed to "section", "article", or such other appropriate word "or phrase in order to accomplish such intentions.

**Section 8.** <u>Severability.</u> If any section, sentence, clause, phrase or word of this Ordinance is for any reason held or declared to be unconstitutional, inoperative or void, such holding or invalidity shall not affect the remaining portions of this Ordinance; and it shall be construed to have been the Commissioner's intent to pass this Ordinance without such unconstitutional, invalid or inoperative part therein; and the remainder of this Ordinance, after the exclusion of such part or parts shall be deemed and held to be valid, as if such parts had not been included herein.

**Section 9.** <u>Conflicts.</u> That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

**Section 10.** <u>Effective Date.</u> This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon final adoption.

Editor's note— Section 1 of Ord. No. 97-007, adopted Sept. 11, 1997, repealed §§ 31.55 and 31.56, which pertained to establishment of a volunteer fire department and the fire chief and department members, respectively, and derived from § 9-3(a) and (b) of the 1969 Code; Ord. 71; and Am. Ord. 87-011. Section 2 of Ord. No. 97-007 enacted similar provisions to read as herein set out.

Sec. 31.55. - Establishment.

There is hereby created and established a fire department, consisting of a chief, and such other members of said fire department as may from time to time be provided for by the city commission. The chief and members thereof shall be appointed by the city manager.

(Ord. 97-007, passed 9-11-97)

Sec. 31.56. - Duties.

It shall be the function and duty of the fire department and every member thereof to extinguish fires and to prevent the occurrence or spread of such fires.

(Ord. 97-007, passed 9-11-97)

Sec. 31.57. - Membership—Organization, position created.

The fire department shall consist of as many members as may be decided upon by the city commission. The fire department shall be governed as all other departments of the city. In addition to the fire chief, there may be volunteer firefighters. There shall be such number of positions for volunteer firefighters as are from time to time approved by the city commission.

(Ord. 97-007, passed 9-11-97)

Sec. 31.58. - Investigation of applicants.

(A)

The chief of police, and members of the police department acting in his name, are hereby authorized to conduct a field investigation and are hereby directed to conduct criminal records checks on each applicant for employment by the fire department.

(B)

The chief of police or a member of the police department acting on his behalf shall prepare a factual summary of the background investigation and criminal records check of each firefighter applicant and transmit such summary to the fire chief for the purpose of determining the fitness of an applicant. The summary may contain recommendations to the fire chief concerning the suitability for employment of

a firefighter applicant. The fire chief shall submit his recommendations to the city manager for final approval.

(C)

Background investigations and record checks shall include records of all convictions as an adult.

(D)

Any applicant for membership in the fire department who is denied employment on the basis of the investigation summary referred to in this section may inspect that summary for the purpose of clarifying, explaining or denying the accuracy of its contents.

(E)

The chief of police and members of the police department shall not reveal any information or make any recommendation to the fire chief regarding the fitness of firefighter applicants other than that contained in the official summary report referred to in this section.

(Ord. 97-007, passed 9-11-97)

Sec. 31.59. - Best qualified to be hired.

The firefighters shall be appointed for the purpose of fulfilling a need of the municipality, not for the purpose of providing a social club. All hiring shall be done on the basis of hiring the best qualified person, not on the basis of hiring members of any particular group or clique.

(Ord. 97-007, passed 9-11-97)

Sec. 31.60. - Examination and training.

No person shall be appointed to the position of firefighter unless he has taken or will take a training course prescribed by the city manager, and passed, or will sit for, an examination indicating adequate knowledge of the matters taught in the course. Matters covered shall include methods of fire fighting, types of building, operation of equipment, first aid, treatment of smoke inhalation, administering cardiopulmonary resuscitation or CPR, and such other relevant items as shall be directed by the city manager. In the case of any individual who has prior experience as a firefighter on a volunteer fire department or on a full-time fire department or has otherwise met the training and test requirement, the city manager may waive any part of the course or testing requirement. Any individual taking the training course prescribed above must complete such course and pass the requisite examination within one year of being appointed as a firefighter. Notwithstanding, any other personnel rule or regulation to the contrary, firefighters serve at the pleasure of the city manager.

(Ord. 97-007, passed 9-11-97)

Sec. 31.61. - Required in-service training.

All firefighters shall take regular training at least once each month, on the subjects prescribed and in the manner prescribed by the fire chief and approved by the city manager. The city manager shall require a minimum number of hours of training each month for each member. The minimum number

of hours shall be the amount required, in the opinion of the city manager or otherwise prescribed by law, to learn new techniques and to continue to maintain skills under old techniques.

(Ord. 97-007, passed 9-11-97)

Sec. 31.62. - Supervision over department—Equipment.

The fire chief shall have the control, subject to the order and direction of the city manager, of the fire department and all fire apparatus belonging to the city; whenever any fire apparatus needs repairing said fire chief, with the approval of the city manager, shall cause the same to be done without delay.

(Ord. 97-007, passed 9-11-97)

Sec. 31.63. - Command at fires.

In case of fire, the fire chief and his assistants shall rank in the order named and the officer of the highest rank at the fire shall take command of the fire department, and direct the management thereof for the suppression of the fire, in the best manner possible; and when it may be necessary for the protection of other property and to prevent the spread of the conflagration, the officer in command may cause the buildings to be removed, torn down or destroyed in the best manner possible.

(Ord. 97-007, passed 9-11-97)

Sec. 31.64. - Obedience to orders.

No firefighter in attendance at a fire shall neglect or refuse to obey the orders of the officer in command at such fire.

(Ord. 97-007, passed 9-11-97)

Sec. 31.65. - Compensation.

Members of the fire department shall receive compensation as provided for by the city commission. Members shall not be otherwise paid unless approved by the city commission.

(Ord. 97-007, passed 9-11-97)

Sec. 31.66. - Duties of spectators.

Spectators shall keep away from any fire, so as to be out of the firefighters' way.

(Ord. 97-007, passed 9-11-97)

Sec. 31.67. - Entering firehouses.

It shall be and hereby is declared unlawful for any person or persons to enter the fire department house or any place where the equipment and apparatus of the fire department is stored, at any time, except on business pertaining to the fire department or any other city business, unless authorized by the city commission.

(Ord. 97-007, passed 9-11-97)

Sec. 31.68. - Enforcement of ordinances.

It shall be the duty of all police officers of the city to see that the provisions of §§ 31.66 and 31.67 are enforced and to arrest on view any person who shall be found violating any of the provisions of this chapter or who shall hinder, resist, or refuse to obey any such officer in the discharge of his duty.

(Ord. 97-007, passed 9-11-97)

Sec. 31.69. - Records.

The fire chief shall keep or cause to be kept a record of all fires and all other responses, and during the last week of each month, file with the city clerk a full report of such records, which report shall be under oath. All records of the fire department, being city records, shall be subject to the provisions of F.S. Ch. 119.

(Ord. 97-007, passed 9-11-97)

Sec. 31.70. - Organization and fund-raising.

The firefighters may create an organization of firefighters, hold meetings and engage in fund-raising activities. No fund-raising activity shall be engaged in without the prior approval of the city manager.

(Ord. 97-007, passed 9-11-97)

Sec. 31.71. - Service outside corporate limits.

Members of the fire department are authorized to go outside the corporate limits of the city for the purpose of rendering aid to other fire departments in accordance with mutual aid agreements.

- <u>Section 2</u>. The City Manager is directed to replace the repealed policy with the new policy 2.4 adopted herein into the City's Personnel Policies and Procedures Manual, and update the title page of the manual to reflect the last revision.
- <u>Section 3</u>. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final adoption by the City Commission of the City of Fruitland Park, Florida.

#### **EXHIBIT A**

### 2.4 Family Employment and Nepotism and Personal Relationships

The City wants to ensure that employment practices do not create situations such as conflict of interest or favoritism and problems with employee morale. This extends to practices that involve employee hiring, promotion and transfer.

- (a) Relatives of the City Manager, City Clerk, Department Managers, or any other City employee, shall not be employed by the City of Fruitland Park.
- (b) Relatives of City Manager, City Clerk, Department Managers, or any other City employee who are employed by the City of Fruitland Park on the date this policy is adopted may continue employment with the City of Fruitland Park; however, no relative of an employee shall be in a position to supervise or review another relative's job performance nor shall any related employees be allowed to work in the same department.
- (c) Those in a dating relationship or are partners or members of the same household shall not be employed by the City of Fruitland Park.
- (d) Employees in a dating relationship or are partners or members of the same household on the date this policy is adopted may continue employment with the City of Fruitland Park; however, the concerned employees shall not be in a position to supervise or review the other concerned employees job performance nor be allowed to work in the same department.
- (e) Employees who begin a dating relationship or become relatives, partners or members of the same household and if one party is in a supervisory position, the person in the supervisory position is required to immediately inform the City Manager and Human Resources of the relationship. The employees concerned will be given the opportunity to decide who is to be transferred to another available position. If that decision is not made within seven calendar days, the City Manager will decide who is to be transferred or, if necessary terminated from employment.
- (f) Employees who begin a dating relationship or become relatives, partners or members of the same household will be permitted to continue to work for the City of Fruitland Park as long as there are no substantial conflicts. Reasonable accommodations will be made when possible in the event a conflict arises. However, if a conflict arises and no reasonable accommodation can be made, the employee hired last will be terminated.
- (g) For purposes of this policy, relative means an individual who is related as father, mother, son, daughter, brother, sister, uncle, aunt, first cousin, nephew, niece, husband, wife, father-in-law, mother-in-law, son-in-law, daughter-in-law, brother-in-law, sister-in-law, stepfather, stepmother, stepson, stepdaughter, stepbrother, stepsister, half-brother, or half-sister.

### **RESOLUTION 2013 -023**

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF FRUITLAND PARK, FLORIDA, PROVIDING FOR A PUBLIC PARTICIPATION POLICY WITH REGARD TO MEETINGS OF CITY BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS; PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

**WHEREAS**, the City Commission wishes to adopt a public participation policy for meetings of the City's boards and commissions; and

WHEREAS, the City Commission accordingly desires to pass this Resolution 2013-023 to do so.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF FRUITLAND PARK, FLORIDA, AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1</u>. The following Public Participation Policy shall apply to meetings of City boards or commissions as provided herein.

### Sec. 1. <u>Citizen's Rights</u>

- (a) <u>Definition.</u> For the purposes of this section, "board or commission" means a board or commission of the City of Fruitland Park.
  - (b) Right to be Heard: Members of the public shall be given a reasonable opportunity to be heard on a proposition before a City board or commission except as provided for below. Public input shall be limited to three (3) minutes. This right does not apply to:
    - 1. An official act that must be taken to deal with an emergency situation affecting the public health, welfare, or safety, if compliance with the requirements would cause an unreasonable delay in the ability of the board or commission to act;
    - 2. An official act involving no more than a ministerial act, including, but not limited to, approval of minutes and ceremonial proclamations;
    - A meeting that is exempt from §286.011; or
    - 4. A meeting during which the Commission is acting in a quasi-judicial capacity. This paragraph does not affect the right of a person to be heard as otherwise provided by law.

### Sec. 2. Suspension and Amendment of these Rules

- (a) <u>Suspension of these Rules</u>: Any provision of these rules not governed by the City Charter or City Code may be temporarily suspended by a vote of a majority of the Commission.
- (b) Amendment of these Rules: These rules may be amended or new rules adopted by resolution.

(c) <u>Effect of Variance from Rules</u>: The failure to follow this Public Participation Policy shall not be grounds for invalidating any otherwise lawful act of the City's boards or commissions.

<u>Section 2</u>. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct, and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portion of this Resolution.

Section 3. This Resolution shall become effective immediately upon passage.
